This report marks another year for the Manitoba Round Table for Sustainable Development in its legislated and unique role as advisory body to the Manitoba government in accordance with *The Sustainable Development Act*.

This year the Manitoba Round Table launched the Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards to honour Manitobans who are actively engaged in and promoting sustainability. The Round Table presented the 2008 Awards at an evening celebrating the winners and honourable mentions. Among the 11 winners was the Winnipeg Humane Society in association with Number 10 Architecture who received the Outstanding Achievement in Sustainability for their green facility. The Round Table also selected two recipients for the 2008-09 Sustainable Development Scholarship: a PhD student examining the impacts of genetically modified canola on the impacts of rural livelihoods, and an undergraduate student involved in local participatory activities and sustainable living.

Additional highlights of this year's Manitoba Round Table activities include reviewing the provincial Principles and Guidelines of Sustainable Development and working on year one activities of its new three year strategic work plan.

## INTRODUCTION

The Manitoba Round Table for Sustainable Development (MRT) was established on proclamation of *The Sustainable Development Act* on July 1, 1998. This is the 2008-09 Annual Report of the Manitoba Round Table as required by Section 4 of the Act.

In 2008-09, the MRT was engaged in a variety of areas related to sustainability in the province. The MRT committees and task groups included the Sustainable Development Scholarship Evaluation Committee, Sustainability Awards Planning Committee and Standing Committees on Agriculture, Green Buildings, Water and Waste, as well as task groups reviewing the Principles and Guidelines of Sustainable Development, the provincial Sustainability Report and MRT Workplan.

During this fiscal year, the MRT worked on year one activities in its new three year strategic workplan. The MRT also launched a new awards program – the Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards, to honour contributions to sustainability in Manitoba. The MRT continued to improve its understanding of government policies and activities through relevant presentations on community economic development, fair trade, the East Side of Lake Winnipeg, and public sector green procurement. The MRT also provided recommendations on government policy and initiatives.

## MANITOBA ROUND TABLE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Manitoba Round Table for Sustainable Development is an advisory body to the government of Manitoba. Its role is to advise and support decision-makers in making responsible environmental, social and economic decisions. The Manitoba Round Table is an integral component of the province's Sustainable Development Strategy.

Members are appointed by the Minister of Conservation through Order-in-Council. Bringing a broad range of experience and technical expertise, and representing regions and sectors of the province, Manitoba Round Table members contribute to sound and informed implementation of sustainable development strategies in every aspect of public administration. To reflect government's commitment to sustainable development and to emphasize the cross-departmental responsibilities in implementation, eight cabinet ministers serve as members of the Manitoba Round Table.

During 2008-09, there were 26 members of the Manitoba Round Table, with the Minister of Conservation serving as Chairperson. The group met three times over the 2008-09 period, fulfilling the legislated requirement under *The Sustainable Development Act*.

## DUTIES OF THE MANITOBA ROUND TABLE

The duties of the Manitoba Round Table, as legislated by *The Sustainable Development Act* are:

- Creating awareness and understanding of sustainable development
- Co-operating with public-sector organizations, private industry, non-government organizations and the public to share knowledge and experience
- Reviewing the principles and guidelines of sustainable development to ensure they are comprehensive and contemporary
- Advising on development and review of the Sustainable Development Strategy
- Advising on development and review of sustainability indicators
- At the request of the minister, reviewing existing or proposed policy, legislation, regulations or programs for consistency with the principles and guidelines, and reporting to the minister with recommendations

- Establishing mechanisms for monitoring and evaluating implementation of sustainable development strategies and activities
- Other tasks and activities related to sustainable development, at the request of the minister

## POWERS OF THE MANITOBA ROUND TABLE

The Manitoba Round Table may:

- Make its own rules of procedure, including procedures of committees
- Identify, promote and encourage projects and activities that exemplify sustainable development practices
- Initiate, sponsor and support seminars, workshops, and conferences related to sustainable development
- Conduct studies and investigations, and advise and make recommendations to the minister on matters related to sustainable development, other than matters involving the gathering of evidence to determine whether or not specific persons or bodies are complying with the provisions of the act and the regulations
- Publish reports and other materials
- Do all things necessary to the effective carrying out of its duties under *The Sustainable Development Act*

## ACTIVITIES OF THE MANITOBA ROUND TABLE

In 2008-09, the MRT actively worked on initiatives in support of sustainable development. Through its committee-based work, the MRT provided advice to decision makers in government on making responsible environmental, social and economic decisions for the province. Advice included recommendations on more widely adopting community economic development, encouraging sustainable and green procurement in both public and private sectors, supporting composting initiatives in the province, and launching an awards program to honour people and organizations who are making contributions towards sustainability in Manitoba. In addition, a number of featured speakers provided informative and engaging presentations on related topics. The MRT met three times in the 2008-09 period. The venues were chosen keeping sustainability in mind.

### MAY 14, 2008 MEETING - MCPHILLIPS STREET STATION

At the May 14th meeting Donna Dagg, Sustainable Development Coordinator for the Manitoba Lottery Corporation (MLC) provided an overview of MLC's sustainable development initiatives and green operations. Donna informed the MRT of MLC's corporate social responsibility policy, but noted the challenges of implementing green procurement lie with the level of awareness among purchasers, vendors and those that control the budgets and make business decisions on behalf of an organization. She is part of a multi-stakeholder team that is developing a green procurement tool to share success stories and improve education.

Brendan Reimer, Prairies and Northern Territories Coordinator of the Canadian Community Economic Development Network, presented on community economic development (CED). Brendan highlighted the alignment of CED principles with the sustainable development principles, and stressed that more public education and recognition is necessary to promote CED. MRT members discussed CED and the importance of making the provincial CED policy, lens and framework more publicly visible.

The MRT approved the 2008-09 graduate and undergraduate student recipients of the Sustainable Development Scholarships. The MRT received an update on planning and preparation of the 2008 Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards. The MRT approved the materials and awards presentation to take place November 27, 2009, during the Education for Sustainable Development Conference at the Delta Winnipeg.

The MRT Workplan Task Group presented the results of its MRT mandate and operations review. The MRT approved the three year workplan for 2008-2011 which provides a clear, focused course of action for the MRT.

### OCTOBER 22, 2008 MEETING - RALPH CONNOR HOUSE, 54 WEST GATE

On October 22nd, Donna Legg of Friends of Ralph Connor House provided an overview of the House's history and recent energy conservation initiatives. The Chair welcomed new members Minister Andrew Swan, Richard Kula and Shauna MacKinnon.

The MRT approved proposed changes to the Sustainable Development Scholarship guidelines and application form to bring clarity to the eligibility criteria. The Sustainability Report Review Task Group provided a summary of their discussions on review of the 2005 Sustainability Report and recommendations for future reports. Standing Committees presented reports on their activities. The MRT agreed to continue with committees on Agriculture, Green Buildings and Water. The committees of Climate Change and Waste agreed to sunset until needed.

The MRT received the Composting Symposium Workshop Report from Resource Conservation Manitoba and reviewed its recommendations. The MRT supported the report's recommendations and forwarded the report for government consideration.

Don Sullivan provided a presentation on his upcoming book of wilderness photography of the boreal forest on the East Side of Lake Winnipeg. Zack Gross, MRT member, provided information on fair trade principles and opportunities to promote fair trade including integrating fair trade concepts into the provincial sustainable development principles. MRT members discussed ways of promoting fair trade products such as promoting fair trade coffee in government workplaces.

MRT members approved proposed winners and honourable mentions of the 2008 Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards as selected by the Awards Evaluation Committee. The Principles and Guidelines Task Group provided an overview of their proposed revisions to the Principles and Guidelines of Sustainable Development with further discussion to follow at the next MRT meeting.

## **FEBRUARY 11, 2009 MEETING - MANITOBA LEGISLATURE**

At the February 11th meeting Zack Gross provided an update on fair trade action items and encouraged MRT members to participate in the fair trade one month challenge beginning February 14. MRT members received an overview of the government's five year review of the *Sustainable Development Code of Practice, Financial Management Guidelines and Procurement Guidelines*. Members discussed progress on public sector implementation and opportunities to improve reporting.

The MRT approved 2008-09 workplan. The Water Committee provided a brief update on activities of a youth water project that is currently working with Green Manitoba conducting water efficiency home inspections in 40 homes in Gimli. MRT members congratulated efforts to date.

An update on the 2009 Provincial Sustainability Report was provided with notice that the draft report would follow for MRT review and feedback. Members received a hard copy of the proposed revisions to the *Principles and Guidelines of Sustainable Development* for final review and approval at the next MRT meeting.

Minister Struthers provided remarks on the 2008 Sustainability Awards program and November 27th awards reception. MRT members were pleased with delivery of the Awards program and discussed opportunities for improvement. The MRT agreed to hold another awards event in 2009 and provided direction to the Awards Planning Committee.

Donna Dagg of the Manitoba Lotteries Corporation and member of the Public Sector Green Procurement Working Group provided a presentation on a public sector green procurement website in development to assist public sector purchasers. MRT members were impressed with the website and supported having the tool publicly available. Members closed the meeting with a hot-button issue round table where they shared current areas of interest and concern related to sustainability in the province.

## **SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP**

The Sustainable Development Scholarship Program, established in 1996, annually awards scholarships to post-secondary students in Manitoba pursuing studies and research embracing the spirit and principles of sustainable development. The program is open to students in any field of study at an approved Manitoba post-secondary institution. The scholarship is intended to cover tuition, books, fees and other education-related expenses. Each year \$6,000 is awarded to a graduate student and \$1,500 is awarded to a college or undergraduate student. Winners are recommended by the MRT Scholarship Evaluation Committee and approved by the Manitoba Round Table.

### **2008-2009 SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS**

Ms. Alexis Knispel was awarded the \$6,000 graduate scholarship. Alexis is a University of Manitoba PhD student in Geography. Alexis' doctoral research will examine the impacts of genetically modified (GM) crops in a long-term, multi-scale study characterizing the spread of herbicide tolerant traits in escaped canola populations. Her study will also identify and link the ecological impacts of GM crops with the economic, social and environmental impacts on rural livelihoods and on Manitoba's farming economy.

Ms. Emily Wiebe was awarded the \$1,500 undergraduate scholarship. Emily is majoring in International Development Studies at the Canadian Mennonite University. Emily is engaged in extracurricular activities which involve participatory local action, from organizing environmental rallies to volunteering at a homeless shelter. She aspires to find creative ways to celebrate diversity and foster sustainable living practices.

The two 2008-09 Sustainable Development Scholarship winners were honoured at the 2008 Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards on November 27, 2008 at the delta Winnipeg.

### **MANITOBA EXCELLENCE IN SUSTAINABILITY AWARDS**

To recognize Manitobans who embrace the spirit and principles of sustainable development, the Manitoba Round Table for Sustainable Development established the Manitoba Excellence in Sustainability Awards, in 2008. The Awards recognize and honour people, projects, and ideas that successfully apply the Principles and Guidelines of Sustainable Development into concrete and lasting achievements.

The Sustainability Awards Planning Committee, consisting of MRT members and staff from three government departments, developed the award categories and application and evaluation criteria, and commissioned local artist Ken Hildebrand to design a unique award program logo and glass award, which integrates the three pillars of sustainability.

For the 2008 awards, the Sustainability Awards Evaluation Panel reviewed 44 submissions in 11 categories. The proposed shortlist of winners and honourable mentions was presented to the MRT for review and approval. The MRT announced the 2008 winners at an awards reception on November 27, 2008 at the Delta Winnipeg during the Manitoba Education for Sustainable Development Conference.

## MEMBERS BIOGRAPHIES

### **HONOURABLE STAN STRUTHERS - CHAIR**

#### **Minister of Conservation**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Dauphin-Roblin*

Stan Struthers was first elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1995 as the member for Dauphin and was re-elected as the MLA for Dauphin-Roblin in 1999 and again in 2003. In his first term, he served as the NDP's Natural Resources Critic and Deputy Agriculture Critic and served as the Legislative Assistant to the Minister of Health, the Honourable Dave Chomiak. He was appointed Minister of Conservation in November, 2003. Stan graduated from Swan Valley Regional Secondary School in 1977, and later received his Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Education degrees from Brandon University, and his Masters of Education from the University of Manitoba. A teaching career that began at Norway House Reserve also took Stan to teaching positions in the Parkland area, including a two-year term as principal of Rorketon Collegiate. Stan currently resides in Dauphin and is active in the community as a member of the Wildlife Federation, the Dauphin and District Chamber of Commerce, and as a volunteer for Citizens on Patrol.

### **HONOURABLE STEVE ASHTON**

#### **Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Thompson*

Steve Ashton was first elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1981. He was re-elected in the general elections of 1986, 1988, 1990, 1995, 1999 and 2003. He was appointed Minister of Highways and Government Services in October, 1999 (later changed to Transportation and Government Services) and Minister responsible for The Gaming Control Act in July, 2000. He was appointed Minister responsible for Emergency Measures in October 2001. In September 2002, Steve was appointed Minister of Conservation and in November 2003, became the first appointed Minister of Water Stewardship, a department that is solely committed to water issues and is the only department committed to water in Canada. Steve was appointed as Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs on September 21, 2006. Steve is a graduate of R.D. Parker Collegiate in Thompson. He has a B.A. (Hon.) in Political Studies at the University of Manitoba and a M.A. in Economics from Lakehead University.

**HONOURABLE PETER BJORNSON**

**Minister of Education, Citizenship and Youth**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Gimli*

Peter Bjornson is a lifelong resident of the Interlake. A teacher by profession, Peter devoted 13 years of his life to his students. Peter's involvement at the scholastic level included coaching volleyball and basketball, assisting with student council, and participating in the drug and alcohol policy, school improvement and discipline committees. Peter has also served as a Councillor for the Town of Gimli where he gained valuable experience in local governance. During his term, Peter was a key player in the historic municipal merger between the Town and RM of Gimli. Peter was raised in a household where community service wasn't unique or exceptional, but expected. He has served on the Gimli and District Restitution and Reconciliation Committee for Youth Justice and was president of the Kinsmen Club of Gimli. He co-chaired two Kinsmen projects that raised capital funds for a new health centre. Furthermore, Peter has represented the town of Gimli on the Gimli Recreation Society, the Icelandic Festival Committee, the Gimli Youth Advisory Board, the Western Canada Summer Games, the Gimli Fire Committee, the Gimli Harbour Committee and the Canada Day Committee. He also served as chairperson of the Parks and Recreation Committee.

**HONOURABLE RON LEMIEUX**

**Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for La Verendrye*

Ron Lemieux was an educator for over 14 years prior to his 1999 election to the Legislature as the MLA for La Verendrye. Ron earned his BA and BEd from the University of Winnipeg. He also completed Post Baccalaureate Certification in Education from the University of Manitoba. Before becoming an educator Ron worked as a recreation director. He was also employed as a provincial civil servant and brings with him an intimate knowledge of how government works. Ron's community involvement has included coaching and serving as volunteer Vice-President of the Lorette Sports Centre. As a teacher advocate he held a number of positions in his teacher's association. Ron was appointed as Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation on September 21, 2006. Previously he was Minister of Transportation and Government Services, Minister of Education and Youth, Minister of Culture, Heritage and Tourism and the Minister responsible for Sport as well as the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs.

**HONOURABLE JIM RONDEAU**

**Minister of Science, Technology, Energy and Mines**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Assiniboia*

Jim was first elected as the MLA for Assiniboia in the 1999 Manitoba election. He was appointed Legislative Assistant to the Deputy Premier and Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs in 2002. Jim has served on various committees and provincial level task forces. Prior to entering politics, Jim had an extensive career in education. He earned his Bachelor of Education degree from the University of Winnipeg, and completed post-baccalaureate studies at the University of Manitoba. He has taught at schools in Norway House and Cranberry Portage, and was a seminar and school experience instructor at the University of Winnipeg. Jim's work as an educator, at all levels within the public schools system, reflects his dedication to life-long learning throughout Manitoba. Jim has always been a willing and committed community volunteer. He has served on the Cranberry Portage Ambulance Service and been involved with the St. John Ambulance Volunteer Services.

**HONOURABLE ANDREW SWAN**

**Minister of Competitiveness, Training and Trade**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Minto*

Andrew was first elected as the MLA for Minto in the 2004 by-election and re-elected in 2007. He was appointed as the Legislative Assistant to the Minister of Justice in October 2004, and in December 2006 was also appointed as the Legislative Assistant to the Minister of Labour, Immigration, and Multiculturalism. On February 4, 2008, Andrew was appointed as the Minister of Competitiveness, Training and Trade. Born and raised in Winnipeg, Andrew graduated from Silver Heights Collegiate and then attended the University of Manitoba. In 1990, he graduated from the U of M Law School. **HONOURABLE ROSANN WOWCHUK**

**Deputy Premier**

**Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives**

*Member of Legislative Assembly for Swan River*

Rosann Wowchuk is Manitoba's Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives and the province's Deputy Premier. She was first elected as the MLA for Swan River in 1990 and re-elected in both the 1995 and 1999 general elections. On October 5, 1999, Rosann was appointed Minister of Agriculture and Food. With her re-election on June 3, 2003, Rosann became Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives and was appointed Deputy Premier. *Member of Legislative Assembly for Riel*

She attended Minnetonka School and Dakota Collegiate, and earned a BA Hons. from the University of Manitoba. ## APPENDIX I

### PRINCIPLES AND GUIDELINES OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

#### PRINCIPLES:

##### **Integration of Environmental and Economic Decisions**

- 1(1) Economic decisions should adequately reflect environmental, human health and social effects.
- 1(2) Environmental and health initiatives should adequately take into account economic, human health and social consequences.

##### **Stewardship**

- 2(1) The economy, the environment, human health and social well-being should be managed for the equal benefit of present and future generations.
- 2(2) Manitobans are caretakers of the economy, the environment, human health and social well-being for the benefit of present and future generations.
- 2(3) Today's decisions are to be balanced with tomorrow's effects.

##### **Shared Responsibility and Understanding**

- 3(1) Manitobans should acknowledge responsibility for sustaining the economy, the environment, human health and social well-being, with each being accountable for decisions and actions in a spirit of partnership and open co-operation.
- 3(2) Manitobans share a common economic, physical and social environment.
- 3(3) Manitobans should understand and respect differing economic and social views, values, traditions and aspirations.
- 3(4) Manitobans should consider the aspirations, needs and views of the people of the various geographical regions and ethnic groups in Manitoba, including Aboriginal peoples, to facilitate equitable management of Manitoba's common resources.

**Prevention**

- 4 Manitobans should anticipate, and prevent or mitigate, significant adverse economic, environmental, human health and social effects of decisions and actions, having particular careful regard to decisions whose impacts are not entirely certain but which, on reasonable and well-informed grounds, appear to pose serious threats to the economy, the environment, human health and social well-being.

**Conservation and Enhancement**

- 5 Manitobans should
- (a) maintain the ecological processes, biological diversity and life-support systems of the environment
  - (b) harvest renewable resources on a sustainable yield basis
  - (c) make wise and efficient use of renewable and non-renewable resources
  - (d) enhance the long-term productive capability, quality and capacity of natural ecosystem

**Rehabilitation and Reclamation**

- 6 Manitobans should
- (a) endeavour to repair damage to or degradation of the environment
  - (b) consider the need for rehabilitation and reclamation in future decisions and actions

**Global Responsibility**

- 7 Manitobans should think globally when acting locally, recognizing that there is economic, ecological and social interdependence among provinces and nations, and working cooperatively, within Canada and internationally, to integrate economic, environmental, human health and social factors in decision-making while developing comprehensive and equitable solutions to problems

**GUIDELINES:**

**Efficient Use of Resources** - which means

- (a) encouraging and facilitating development and application of systems for proper resource pricing, demand management and resource allocation together with incentives to encourage efficient use of resources
- (b) employing full-cost accounting to provide better information for decision makers

**Public Participation** - which means

- (a) establishing forums which encourage and provide opportunity for consultation and meaningful participation in decision-making processes by Manitobans
- (b) endeavouring to provide due process, prior notification and appropriate and timely redress for those adversely affected by decisions and actions
- (c) striving to achieve consensus amongst citizens with regard to decisions affecting them

**Access to Information** - which means

- (a) encouraging and facilitating the improvement and refinement of economic, environmental, human health and social information
- (b) promoting the opportunity for equal and timely access to information by all Manitobans

**Integrated Decision Making and Planning** - which means

encouraging and facilitating decision making and planning processes that are efficient, timely, accountable and cross-sectoral and which incorporate an inter-generational perspective of future needs and consequences.

**Waste Minimization and Substitution** - which means

- (a) encouraging and promoting the development and use of substitutes for scarce resources where such substitutes are both environmentally sound and economically viable
- (b) reducing, reusing, recycling and recovering the products of society

**Research and Innovation** - which means

encouraging and assisting the researching, development, application and sharing of knowledge and technologies which further our economic, environmental, human health and social well-being.
