

Manitoba Youth Centre

Manitoba Youth Centre (MYC), located at 170 Doncaster Street in Winnipeg, is the largest youth correctional centre in Manitoba. The centre provides care, custody and a variety of programs for about 150 young people charged with an offence or sentenced to a term of custody under *The Youth Criminal Justice Act.*

Young people admitted to MYC have been:

- charged with a youth offence and remanded in custody, awaiting a decision by the court
- committed to open or secure custody by the court
- brought to the centre under charge by the police

Young people under the influence of drugs or alcohol may also be held at the centre under *The Intoxicated Persons Detention Act* until they are detoxified and can safely be released to a responsible person. They receive a notice to appear in court at a later date.

Programs

Programs offered to offenders at MYC:

- anger management
- · victim awareness
- academic/education
- Culturally Appropriate Program
- Triple P parenting
- Voices (gender responsive program for young females)
- Thinking Awareness Group
- substance abuse
- spiritual and religious programs
- · lifestyle and health related programs

Juvenile counsellors manage the information and intervention programs. Teachers provide individual educational programs. Volunteers manage a range of programs, such as Alcoholics Anonymous and bible study.

Work Programs

There are limited opportunities for offenders to gain work experience while at MYC including kitchen and groundskeeping/cleaning.



Other Activities

MYC has a secure outdoor recreational area, a gym and an activity area. Juvenile counsellors organize and supervise all activities. Chaplains and Aboriginal spiritual caregivers provide pastoral and spiritual care.

Staff

MYC has nine cottages divided into three centres:

- · remand custody
- open custody
- secure custody

Each cottage is staffed on a 24-hour basis by juvenile counsellors and, during normal school hours, by a qualified teacher, all under the direction of a cottage supervisor and senior unit officer. A shift operation manager provides 24-hour direction in daily operations. Trades instructors prepare meals and supervise the cafeteria work program. Registered nurses and registered psychiatric nurses provide 24-hour medical and mental health services and a paediatrician works at MYC three mornings a week.

Corrections staff must work as part of a team, using sound judgment and a mature, common-sense approach to decision-making and inmate interventions. Candidates will take the correctional officer/juvenile counsellors screening tests. The tests assess written skills, problem-solving and decision-making abilities, judgement and other personal characteristics important for correctional staff. If you are selected for correctional officer/ juvenile counsellor training, you must:

- Submit a recent Criminal Records Search Certificate.*
- Submit Child Abuse and Adult Abuse Registry Checks.
- Submit Emergency or Standard First Aid and CPR Level C certificates.
- Have a valid Manitoba Class 5F driver's licence.
- Meet medical fitness requirements.
- * A previous criminal record does not necessarily mean a person cannot become a correctional officer/ juvenile counsellor — it will depend on the nature of the offence and how long ago the offence was committed. You may apply for a pardon if you meet the requirements.
