There have been a few additions since the original inventory, and where there have been relocations of some memorials that information has been updated.

A Beginning Inventory

Monuments, buildings, plaques, parks, chapels, crosses, cairns, lakes, plinths, statues, streets, gardens, windows, and walls, define the many and varied Manitoba war memorials. They are testaments to individuals and communities at historic moments in the province's history.

There are many more. Buildings have been destroyed. Others are inside buildings, barracks, churches, legions, schools, places of employment. Some are in remote places, a few may have been moved, temporarily out of sight. A program of the Department of Natural Resources naming lakes after war casualties is not covered in this first draft.

Memories furnished by veterans and their descendants fade, and some memorials languish for want of attention. Written and photographic records, therefore, assume greater significance for succeeding generations.

This "beginning inventory" was made possible by a grant from the Heritage Grants Program of Manitoba Culture, Heritage and Citizenship.

Bruce Donaldson and his staff of the History Section of the Historic Resources Branch of Manitoba Culture, Heritage and Citizenship provided encouragement, information and advice.

The Manitoba and Northwestern Command of the Royal Canadian Legion helped by distributing the questionnaire to its branches. Legion members who filled in the questionnaire provided valuable information.

This beginning inventory, of more than 200 memorial sites, attempts to bring together information in one place, prompted by sentiments of the memorial message, "Lest We Forget."

It is but a beginning.

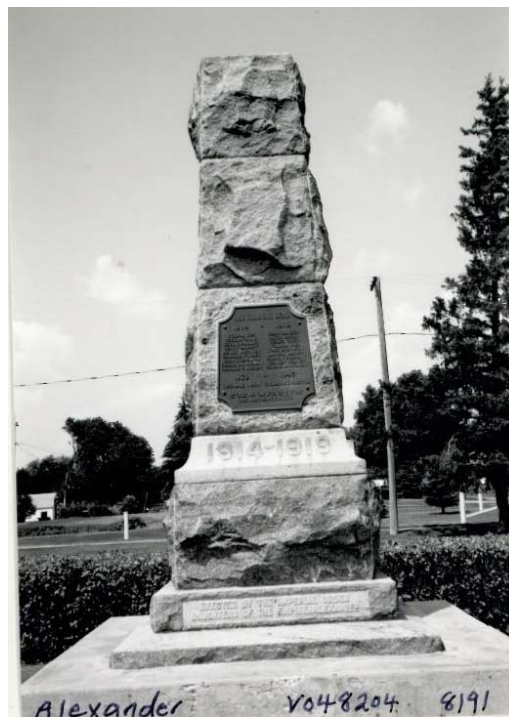

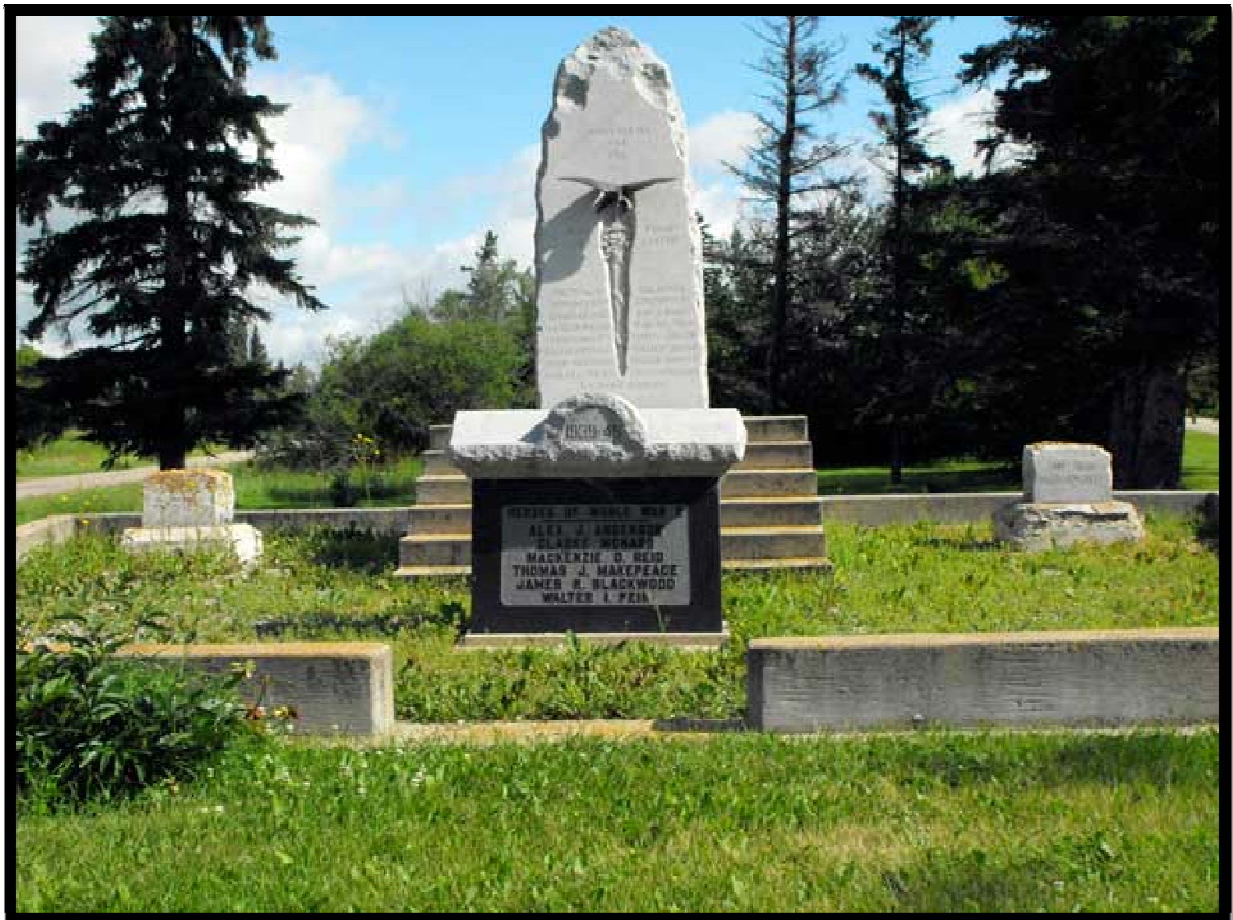

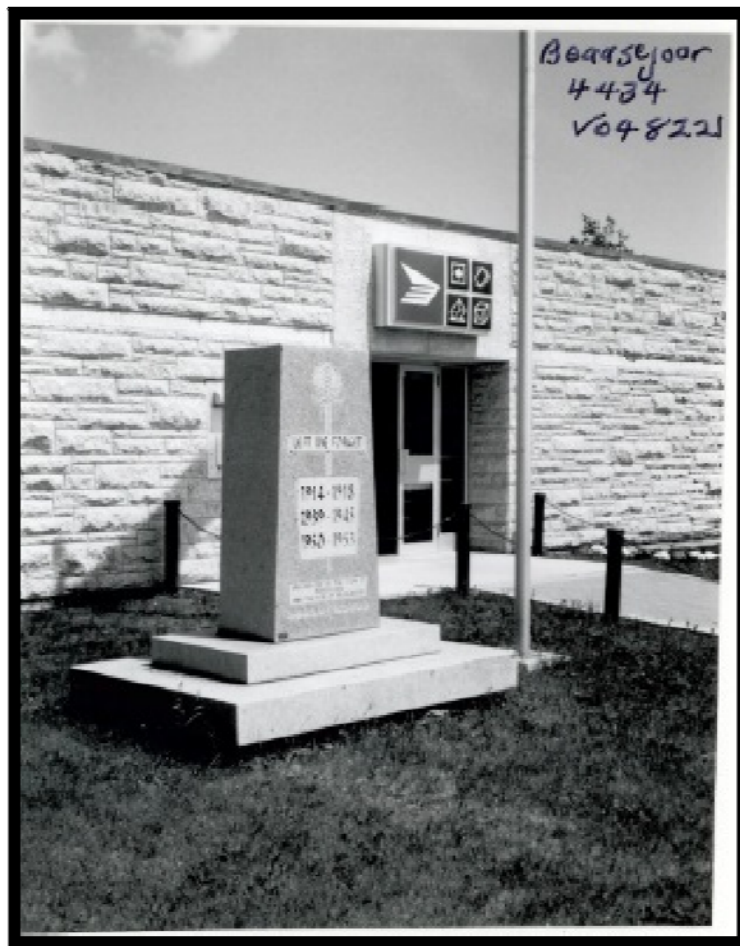

According to the Legion the Statue was moved to the Hospital Location from Main Street around 1950.

There is also a large WOODEN CROSS in the local cemetery inscribed LEST WE FORGET, used for the laying of wreaths and services, and a MURAL on the wall of Legion Hall No. 10.

BOISSEVAIN, (near), INTERNATIONAL PEACE GARDEN Highway 10

Straddles the U.S./Canadian Border and is dedicated to peace. Contains a PEACE CHAPEL and a PEACE TOWER

Major battles are listed on one face, YPRES, SOMME, VIMY RIDGE, PASSCHENDAELE, AMIENS, CAMBRAI.

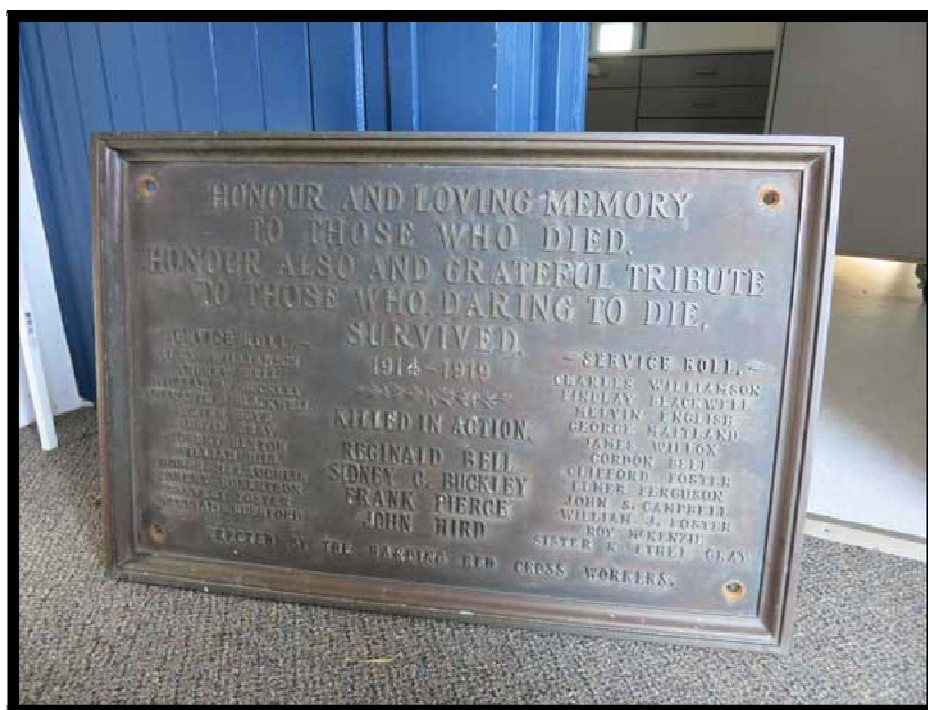

HOLLAND

Highway 2

STATUE of a soldier located in front of Victoria Manor, Stewart Avenue at Patrick Street.

Site was undergoing landscaping at the time of photograph. Statue stands atop an inscribed tablet, on a platform listing battles:
Ypres, Somme, Vimy, Passchendaele.

Inscription. Top line is carved in a semi circle.

Highway 5

Located in front of the Royal Canadian Legion
Branch No. 50. The Memorial is a STATUE of a
SOLDIER on a pedestal standing in a flower bed.

The platform on which the soldier stands has

face, Passchendaele, Vimy Ridge.

Town of Killarney Highway 18, at No.3

Location is on Broadway in front of the Civic Offices
of Town of Killarney and R.M. of Turtle Mountain.

Memorial is a STATUE of a SOLDIER, hands
resting on a cross, atop a stone platform with a
three step base. It stands in a flower bed flanked
by adjacent concrete flower bowls, and a flag pole.

Inscriptions

On the back, facing the Municipal Offices:
