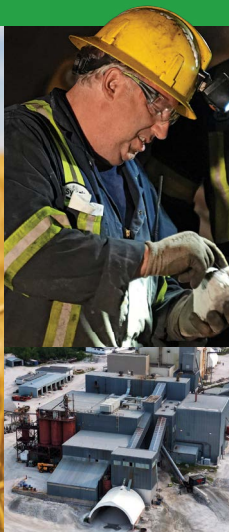


MANITOBA QUICK FACTS

Area: 649,947 square km/250,946 square miles (larger than Japan and twice the size of the U.K.). Manitoba extends from the 49th to the 60th parallel (the equivalent of Paris, France to Oslo, Norway). 1,400 km north to south, 900 km at the widest point and 500 km at the narrowest.

Land Surface: 548,356 square km/211,721 square miles

Water Surface: 101,591 square km/39,225 square miles

Coastline: 645 km/400 miles

Major Products Exported from Manitoba: Agricultural products, processed foods, pharmaceuticals, machinery and parts, vehicles and transport equipment, electrical energy, metals, minerals, plastics and chemicals.

Major Products Imported into Manitoba: Machinery and parts, vehicles and transport equipment, chemical products, minerals, fabricated metal products, cable and optical fibre, agricultural products, electrical and electronic equipment.

Agricultural Commodities: Canola, wheat, hogs, soybeans, cattle and calves, potatoes, dairy products, corn, oats, poultry, eggs, beans, peas, barley and vegetables.

Manitoba's Strategic Advantages: Hydroelectric rates among the lowest in North America, mid-continent transportation gateway, central time zone, skilled multicultural workforce, diverse and stable economy for growth.

Maritime Access: The Port of Churchill is North America's only deepwater Arctic seaport which offers access to the rest of the continent and a direct route to key global markets.

ENVIRONMENT

Climate

Four distinct seasons – cold dry winters, hot dry summers, temperate spring and fall.

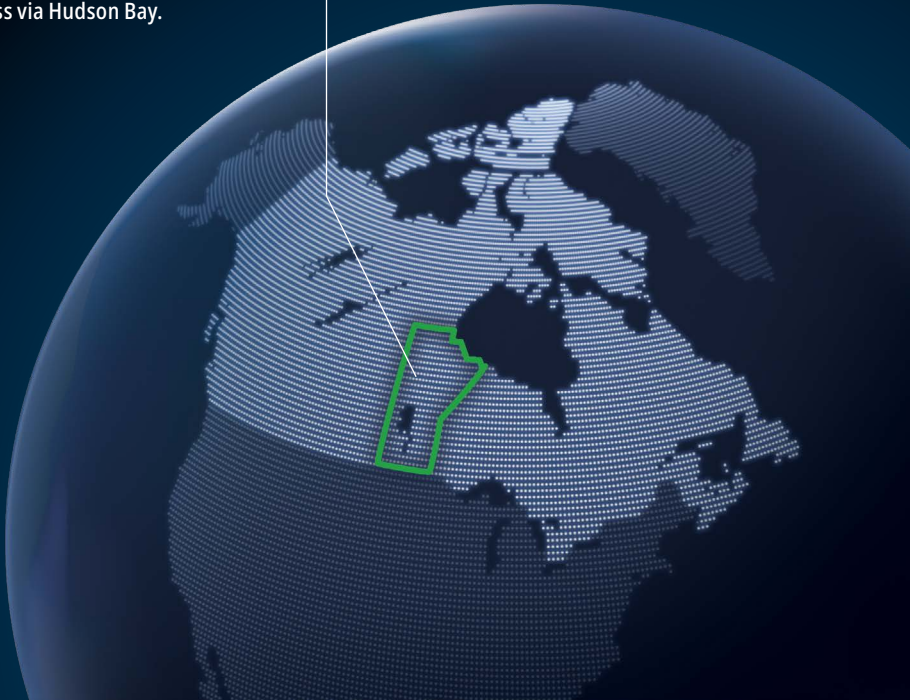
Terrain

Prairie grassland in the south and west, Canadian Shield lakes and forests in the east and north, a small area of Manitoba's extreme north is Arctic tundra with seaport access via Hudson Bay.

Natural Resources

Abundant fresh water, hydroelectricity, minerals, oil, forestry and fish.

Manitoba is home to gold and a wealth of critical minerals including lithium, copper, nickel, silica, graphite, vanadium, cobalt, rare-earth elements and tantalum.



MARKET ACCESS

Strategically located at the centre of North America, Manitoba offers access to major Canadian and U.S. markets through integrated road, rail and air networks. As a key hub within the Mid-Continent Trade Corridor, the province connects seamlessly to both Pacific and Atlantic gateways, supporting efficient global trade with Asia, Europe and beyond. Manitoba's direct rail link to the Port of Churchill—the only deepwater Arctic seaport in North America—and its strong connections to western and eastern seaports position the province as a central player in North America's supply chain and logistics network.

WELL-EDUCATED AND SKILLED WORKFORCE

Seventy per cent of Manitoba's working age population has post-secondary education. The workforce is culturally diverse and multilingual: more than 100 languages are spoken in the province.

Manitoba is home to seven public universities and colleges across the province, offering a diverse range of post-secondary programming designed to meet the evolving needs of employers. These institutions play a vital role in equipping students with the skills and knowledge required in today's labour market.

Complementing these local training opportunities, the Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program has been instrumental in attracting internationally trained and skilled immigrants to the province. This program strengthens Manitoba's workforce by bringing in talent that supports economic growth.

TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURE

Air: An international airport that operates unrestricted 24/7. It offers a broad range of air passenger services and is among the top cargo airports in Canada.

Rail: Serviced by three continental railways, all with direct connections to the United States.

Road: On average, about 1,200 trucks cross the Manitoba–U.S. border at Emerson every day.

Ports: The Port of Churchill is North America's only deepwater Arctic seaport serviced by rail. CentrePort Canada in Winnipeg is North America's largest trimodal inland port offering opportunities for distribution centres, warehousing and manufacturing/processing facilities.

Cross-Border Trade: The Manitoba/U.S. border crossing at Emerson is open 24/7 for all commercial traffic.
