Ms. KORZENIOWSKI moved:

Resolution No. 1: Warbrides

WHEREAS during the entire six years of the second world war tens of thousands of Canadian soldiers were posted overseas mainly in Britain, but all over the world; and

WHEREAS during that time many servicemen and women married foreign nationals in those countries in which they were stationed; and

WHEREAS there were nearly 45,000 women who married Canadian servicemen stationed overseas during the second world war, with 93% of these women coming from the United Kingdom; and

WHEREAS during and after the war these war brides as they were known left their friends, family and ultimately their home countries in great numbers to come and settle and build their lives in Canada; and

WHEREAS in the period from 1942 to 1948 over 64,000 war brides and dependents immigrated to Canada to start their new lives; and

WHEREAS the war brides along with their returning husbands became the new workers, entrepreneurs and leaders of the burgeoning Canadian economy as well as providing the solid foundation for the next generation of Canadians; and

WHEREAS the important sacrifices and work done by war brides took place far from the public eye has yet to receive the recognition it deserves.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the Provincial Government to recognize the enormous sacrifice made by war brides as well as their great contributions to Canada.

Pursuant to Rule 26(1), Messrs. DYCK, MARTINDALE, CUMMINGS and MALOWAY and Mrs. ROWAT made Members' Statements.

Prior to Grievances, Mr. EICHLER rose on a Matter of Urgent Public Importance and moved:

THAT in accordance with Rule 36(1) the ordinary business of the House be set aside to deal with a Matter of Urgent Public Importance, namely: The Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives, on behalf of all Manitobans and the agriculture community, will be participating in discussions with the Federal Government and Provincial Agricultural Ministers this week to determine a negotiating position for the upcoming World Trade Organization (WTO) talks. Members of the Legislature need to provide advice to the Minister of Agriculture prior to the meeting with her provincial and federal counterparts, leading up to the important WTO round of negotiations.

And Mr. EICHLER, Hon. Mr. MACKINTOSH and by leave, Mr. LAMOUREUX having spoken to the urgency of the motion,

WHEREUPON Mr. Speaker ruled as follows:

I thank the Honourable Members for their advice to the Chair on whether the motion proposed by the Honourable Member for Lakeside should be debated today. The notice required by Rule 36(1) was provided. Under our Rules and Practices, the subject matter requiring urgent consideration must be so pressing that the public interest will suffer if the matter is not given immediate attention. There must also be no other reasonable opportunities to raise the matter.

I do not doubt that this matter is one that is of serious concern to some Members in the House.

I have listened very carefully to the arguments put forward, however I was not persuaded that the ordinary business of the House should be set aside to deal with this issue today. Although undoubtedly this is a very serious issue that the Member has brought forward, I do not believe that the public interest will be harmed if the business of the House is not set aside to debate the motion today.
